Tuesday's Children was the first U.S. organization to be listed in the UN Victims of Terrorism Support Portal and has a longstanding partnership with the UN Office of Counter-Terrorism in sharing good practices in supporting global victims of terrorism.

Project COMMON BOND, our international symposium for global youth impacted by terrorism, military conflict or mass violence, has united **1,000+** young adults from **35** countries.

Of the 350+ organizations formed in the aftermath of Tuesday, September 11th, Tuesday's Children is one of the few that remains and the only one that continues to offer long-term healing programs to the families impacted by 9/11 and the ripple effects of this tragedy.

We are proud to be a crucial service provider to thousands of U.S. Military Families of the Fallen, offering them the same life-changing programs as we did for those who lost a loved one on 9/11.

Of the 44,000 military-serving non-profit organizations, less than 1% help the family members left behind and even fewer provide long-term support.

Over more than two decades, we have provided career and college guidance to **6,000+** individuals leveraging a network of **140+** corporate and industry partners.

We are the first organization to offer long-term youth mentoring to children in Military Families of the Fallen, let alone a program with digital e-mentoring capabilities and matches that last far longer than the national average (2.5 years).
